### *Electronic Databases*

Use the Grolier Encyclopedias (Americana, MultiMedia, New Book of Knowledge) and World Book Online databases accessible through the Virtual Reference Collection (VRC).

You can also use the ABC-CLIO American History database accessible through the VRC.

The VRC can be found on the library computers' desktops. Click on the "Virtual Reference" icon or on the "Bookmarks for Samoset Library."
